October 2009 Demo

Keith Rueckert from Ellijay, GA: Hollow forms design and lacquer finishing. According to Keith, he has been turning for about ten years. He was initially inspired by a demo by Willard Baxter at the 1997 Unicoi symposium, followed by a one-day class with Lissi Oland, and the rest is history, as they say.

September Meeting Recap:

DEMO: Jim Talley from Athens, GA was our demonstrator. Jim is a former Chattahoochee Woodturners' member and President. He is known for his miniatures and showed us a number of techniques related to this.

October Saturday Turning Day: Tool Making

The class will be hands-on tool making. We will meet at 9:00 Saturday October 24th at the Baxter Shop. Bring a lunch, drinks are in the fridge.

The class will be a bit different. We are going to require registration and payment for materials. The cost will be \$15 per person for three tools. The normal voluntary shop donation of \$5 per person is in addition to the class fee. The reason for the change is that there is a lot more materials to buy than just wood. We will make a 1/4" round straight scraper using a 1/4" x 8: HSS tool bit. The tool construction is essentially to turn a handle and glue it up. You can grind the tool to a round nose scraper, a round skew or grind a slight hook and call it an internal ornament scraper.

The next tool will be a silver brazed scraper for reaching around the corner of small hollow forms. We will use a 3/16" HSS tool bit which I will braze on 1/4" mild steel round rod. This will then go into a handle you will turn in the class.

The third tool will be a heavier straight scraper. We will begin with a piece of 1/2" mild steel round

rod, drill a hole in one end and glue in a 3/16" HSS tool bit. This will be inserted in a tool handle you turn. If time permits we might experiment on a bit of torch blacksmithing and try to make a goose neck tool shank.

The deadline for registration will be at the end of our regular meeting on Oct. 13th. The reason for registration is that the material cost will be around \$150 depending on how many people we have. I will order material after the registration is complete.

Everything will be provided; HSS tool bits, ferrule material, mild steel, epoxy, wood and a handout so you can remember how to do it again.

Making three tools will be a full day, but I hope that we can have a discussion at lunch about other ways to make tools.

September Turning Day Recap- Hollow globe ornaments

The September turning day at CWT was Saturday, September 12th. Jerry Chandler showed how to create a hollow globe similar to the way boxes are made. The globe is made in two pieces that are then glued together.

Woodturning May be Hazardous to Your Health!

From the Waterdown, Ontario newspaper: "An east Waterdown man was pronounced dead at his Waterdown home on Monday after he was fatally injured by a piece of wood. According to Hamilton Emergency Service – Fire information officer, Bob Simpson, local fire and ambulance crews rushed to Fellows Crescent at approximately 1:10 p.m. for a medical call.

Upon arrival, emergency services personnel discovered a man with no vital signs. "They used the life pack on him, but unfortunately he was pronounced on the scene by paramedics," said Simpson. The information officer told the Review that the Waterdown man was operating a lathe when a piece of wood broke off. The local resident suffered a fatal blow to the head."
