I am looking forward to seeing Walt Wagers' demonstration on "Solving Turning Problems with Scrapers". His workshop the next day, Feb 14 on turning small hollow forms should be fun.

Al Pannell and his committee have worked hard lining up some great workshops. If you are a novice or an old hand, we have a workshop for you. There is no other club in the Atlanta metro area that is providing the tremendous learning opportunities that Chattahoochee has lined up. The cost is a fraction of what you would have to pay to attend a comparable class at Woodcraft or Highland. The club has purchased six thin Penn State HSS parting tools, six face shields and a couple more steb centers as we gear up for the upcoming workshops. Don't delay in signing up for the next workshop.

Your board has endorsed some minor changes to our chapters by laws suggested by our Bylaws Revision committee. The changes will require a vote of approval by the chapter. Here is a highlight of the changes:

- Add a student membership category for folks under 21 at no cost.
- Limit officers to no more than three consecutive terms in the same position
- Incorporate our past practice of crediting new members who join after Oct 1 with being paid for the following year.
- A few minor administrative wording changes for clarification

DEMONSTRATOR: Walt Wager

A teacher for over 40 years, and a woodturner for 10years, Walt Wager received a degree in Industrial Arts from SUNY Oswego, NY, in 1965, and was trained in the art of woodworking, ceramics and print making. He taught high school shop for one year, went back to graduate school at Indiana University, and graduated with a doctoral degree in Instructional Design. After working as a professor of instructional design at FSU, he returned to woodworking in 2002, joining North Florida Woodturners and the Association of American Woodturners. Walt has served as president of North Florida Woodturners twice, and is presently chapter photographer and program chairman. Walt has attended many woodturning symposia, won awards in local and regional exhibits. Walt enjoys teaching others to turn wood, as he develops new creations of his own. Presently he is the coordinator for King Arthur Tools's Camelot woodturning studio, that offers woodturning instruction and workshops by international and professional woodturners. DEMO: Solving turning Problems with Scrapers

What is a scraper - what makes it cut? Furniture scrapers - for turning? Woodturning scrapers, Special purpose - box, hollow form, beads and cove shapes, captive ring tools, Sharpening/honing - microburrs, Negative rake scrapers, Shear scrapers, Carbide and burr-less scrapers, EZ wood tools, Hunter tools - ring carbide tools, Boring bars. More about scrapers than you ever thought there could be.

Up Coming Workshops

FEBRUARY 13TH – WALT WAGER

Small Hollow Forms

Participants will be shown the techniques to turn a small hollow form from beginning to end. They will then use those techniques to turn one or two hollow forms.

The workshop is limited to 7 participants which will provide good opportunity for hands on with the instructor. Some turning experience would be helpful, but not essential. A set of Bodger woodturning tools will be available for each participant. In addition we have some small ornament hollowing tools. It would be desirable for you to bring your tools suitable for a hollow form of approximately 4" deep. This is a great opportunity to get some formal woodturning instruction and guidance from a great instructor. We have a full class for the workshop. Walt is bringing 3x3x5 cherry, maple, and ash blanks for \$5.00ea or each participant can furnish his own. We will need a bowl gouge, spindle gouge, square and round nose scraper and if you want to finish your turning, friction polish, oil, or your favorite quick dry finish. Also your own turning tools if desired. Penn State has the three piece set for \$36 and Walt said it's a decent set, comparable to \$70-\$100 sets at other places. Walt will have an extra set and another set when he is not demonstrating.

MARCH 12TH – KEITH HOLT

BIOGRAPHY:

Keith Holt began working with wood as the culmination of a lifelong pursuit of art. After leaving college to work as a gymnastics instructor and later owning and running his own gymnasium in the Baltimore area, Keith bought his first lathe at a yard sale in 2003 and began exploring the artistic potential of wood. Over the years, he has refined his technique and sought new artistic possibilities in wood. In early 2010, he left the gymnastics world to pursue his art full-time.

Though Keith is new to the field, some of his woodturning work has gained wide recognition. He has demonstrated not only regionally in the Mid-Atlantic but also nationally at the American Association of Woodturning (AAW). His work has gained mention in Woodturning Design, American Woodturner and Creative Woodturning, and was a featured artist in the English Woodturning Magazine. One of his pieces, "Clear View," toured nationally with the 2008 AAW exhibition "Turn for Use II." In 2009, Keith received a POP grant for his work in figurative multi-axis turning. In 2010 a collaborative piece was selected for the special exhibit "A Decade at Echo Lakes." For the past two years he has been pursuing the fine art and craft show events and has been accepted to the Philadelphia Museum of Fine Art Craft Show, the American Craft Expo above Chicago and other top shows in the country.



Artist's Statement:

The spirit within the human figure has been the basis of my inspiration. For the past few years I have explored the uses of the lathe in combination with carving to create figurative sculpture. These forms are achieved through multi-axis turning and/or carving. As an artist, I strive to allow the form of a piece to emerge from the lathe, seeing the circle of movement as an endless stream of possibilities. Though the wood is an essential part of my process, I have painted or burned some of the pieces to add strength to the architectural lines and to disguise the materials. This use of form to reveal the spirit within us provides boundless possibilities to explore.

Workshop:

Creating a Cat Mask

If you can turn a bowl and have some hollowing experience you will have a good foundation for this workshop. In the morning section portion of the workshop I will give you step-by-step hands on experience on creating a cat mask. This process will show you how to utilize green wood and how the lathe benefits the carving of the mask. I will also show how creating processes can improve your time it takes to create a series of pieces. This is a fun and diverse workshop that will give you a larger bucket of skills to apply to your new creations. (Most of this project will be able to be finished during the workshop but some will need to be finished on your own)



Creating Sculpture on the Lathe

The afternoon will go through an exciting new process I have been using the past two years to create a series called "Where We Live". Again, if you can turn a bowl and have some hollowing experience you will have a good foundation for this workshop. This off axis work will be done between centers but what is different about this process is that the hollowing is done first and the form is created around the hollowing. Some rotary carving will be done after the shaping by the lathe. There is a lot of creative freedom with this piece so it could be personalized to many different shapes and forms. We will also spend some time on how to make homemade eccentric jigs that may fit ideas that you may like to explore.

Comments: I've owned this lathe for about six years and have been very pleased with it. It runs very well and still looks pretty good after all these years. The only reason I'm selling it is I just got a Powermatic 3520B and I don't have room for both.

I've turned many spindles, ornaments, boxes, hollow forms and bowls on it with ease. The largest bowl I turned on it was about 10" diameter and it handled it well.
